

2. The structure of Net Languages courses

Each level contains 10 Units and a mid and end-level test (a test after unit 5 and a test at the end of unit 10). Each level is divided into 2 parts: Part A (units 1 - 5) and a mid-level test and Part B (units 6 - 10) and an end-of-level test.

Read this description of an Easter Island statue and choose the picture that best matches it.

The statues are more or less standardised and do not seem to be portraits of individual people. Each one consists of a broad, flat, legless body, with the arms at the sides, surmounted by a large, flat-topped head. The face is angular, with a low, overhanging brow, no obvious eyes, long, shapeless ears; a long, upwardly curved nose with enormous nostrils; and thin, slightly protruding lips above a massive and sharply marked chin.



This is an introduction to the topic of the unit, and may introduce some useful vocabulary as well. Typical exercise types include quizzes and questionnaires.

Reading



This is a text with comprehension tasks; the text is used as a source for language work later in the unit; the comprehension tasks follow a progression from global, or gist, understanding, to a more detailed reading of the text. Vocabulary that is likely to be unfamiliar is linked to the Glossary, which provides a short, context-specific, definition of the word in question.

3. Vocabulary In this section you will study food and drink vocabulary, and some useful adjectives.





coffee champagne sandwich orange juice tea This section focuses on vocabulary in the text, including areas such as word families, collocations, and word formation, as well as exercises designed to help learners deduce lexical meaning from context.

Grammar



In this section you will practise verb patterns (give me the brush and give the brush to me), subject and object pronouns, and can for requests.





1. Verb patterns: give.

Give is a verb that usually goes with the pattern verb + noun + noun:

Give me the brush. I'll give you a call.

Give also takes the pattern verb + noun + to + noun:

This section develops two or three grammatical areas that emerge from the READING task. Grammar features covered typically include such areas as tense, aspect, modality, the article system, noun phrase construction etc. as well as syntax issues such as common verb patterns. This section has links to the GRAMMAR REFERENCE SECTION, that provides more comprehensive explanations of the grammar area under review.

The dictionary is an online dictionary which allows students to translate words from English to other languages on the list.


