Verb + -ing form

She <u>admitted</u> **stealing** the money. She <u>denied</u> **finding** some money. She reported **finding** some money.

Tense review

Past

I **spoke** to him yesterday. (past simple – finished past)
The foundations **were laid** two weeks ago. (past passive – finished past)

Present and up to the present

Dad **cleans** up each afternoon. (present simple – present/now)
The house **is growing** at a great rate. (present continuous – at the moment/now)
Dad **has been taking** photos for you. (present perfect continuous – from the past until now)

Future

The roof **is to go** on next week. (*be* + infinitive – something scheduled in the future)
We expect it **will be** finished in a month or so. (*will* + verb – prediction about the future)
Next week he **is going to fly** to Townsville. (*be going to* + verb – future organised plan)
I **will send** you some photos. (*will* + verb – future intention)
The carpenters **are coming** over for a cup of tea in ten minutes. (present continuous – future

Cause and result 1

arrangement)

Taking performance-enhancing drugs **results in** serious health problems and **leads to** a greatly-reduced life expectancy.

Smoking and drinking **cause** long-term health problems, too.

The problem of doping **is caused by** the pressure on athletes to win.

Lead to, **result in**, **cause** and **be caused by** are all used to talk about the cause or result of an action or situation.



- A leads to B.
- A results in B.
- A causes B.
- B is caused by A.

Cause and result 2

Because, **because of**, **since** and **due to** are used to give the reason for an action or situation.

He was disqualified **because** he failed a drugs test. **Because** he failed a drugs test, he was disqualified.

Because and since are followed by a subject + verb. He was disqualified because/since he failed a drugs test.

Because of and due to are followed by a noun or -ing form.

He was disqualified **because of/due to** <u>a failed</u> drugs test. He was disqualified **because of/due to** failing a drugs test.

Expressing purpose

Jung believed we dream **to** compensate for what was lacking in conscious life. We dream **in order to** forget.

He put on a sweater **so that** he wouldn't be cold.

We can express the same idea in different ways.

Sign your name and you can receive the magazine.

so that ▶ Sign your name so that you can receive the magazine.

in order to ► Sign your name in order to receive the magazine.

Leave early and then you won't miss the train.

so that ▶ Leave early so that you won't miss the train.

in order to ▶ Leave early in order not to miss the train.

Passive review

Active vs. passive

They use ropes to move the statues.
Ropes are used to move the statues.
The islanders carved the statues.
The statues were carved out of stone.
Scientists propose different theories.
Many theories have been proposed.

Passive
Passive
Passive

When the passive is used

Patricia Van Lester was knocked to the ground.

She was flown to Halifax Medical Center.



We use the passive here because:

a. Patricia is the main topic

b. it's not important or it's obvious who caused the action

She got pushed down.

This is an informal way of saying: She was pushed down.

Note:

The passive with **get** often describes a process: **The cut got infected**. The passive with **be** often describes a state: **The cut was infected**.

The passive with **get** is often used with verbs that have a negative meaning: I **got** caught in traffic.

I got robbed.

An exception is to get married.

Verb patterns: verb + -ing

She **recommends keeping** an egg timer by the computer.

Two other verbs with similar meaning that take this pattern are: advise suggest

She **advises keeping** an egg timer by the computer. She **suggests keeping** an egg timer by the computer.

Note how the pattern changes if the person who is receiving the recommendation is mentioned:

She recommends (that) addicts **keep** an egg timer by the computer.

or

Addicts are recommended to keep an egg timer by the computer.

but

She advises addicts to keep an egg timer by the computer.

NOT She advises that addicts keep an egg timer by the computer.

and

Addicts are advised to keep an egg timer by the computer.

and only She suggests (that) addicts keep an egg timer by the computer.

NEVER She suggests addicts to keep an egg timer by the computer.

or

Addicts are suggested to keep an egg timer by the computer.
