Past simple vs. past continuous

When the train **stopped**, she **got** off. (two consecutive events) She **was reading** when the lights **went** out. (an event interrupted something in progress)

Reporting thoughts

Actual thought "The train is slow." "I have come a long way." "I am going to Turkey." "I have arrived in Turkey."

Reported thought

She thought the train was slow. She thought she had come a long way. She thought she was going to Turkey. She thought she had arrived in Turkey.

Verb pattern: verb + wh

After the pattern **verb + question word** we use affirmative word order, not question word order: She didn't know **where** <u>she was</u>. NOT: She didn't know **where** was she.

They misunderstood **what** she was saying. They couldn't understand **how** she had got there.

Other verbs that follow this pattern: (not) care forget guess imagine remember know

Direct question

"Where am I?" "Who are you?" "Where am I?" "Where is the hotel?" "Where do you live?" "When does the train leave?" "Why is she late?" Verb + question word She didn't know where she was. I don't care who you are. You'll never guess where I am. I can't remember where the hotel is. I've forgotten where you live. I don't know when the train leaves. He doesn't understand why she is late.

USEFUL PHRASES

Asking directions

Excuse me. Where is ...? Can you tell me where the ... is? Is it far? How far is it roughly? Thanks for your trouble.

Giving directions

Continue on down the street until you get to Take the first/second street on your left/right. It's about two or three blocks up, on your left/right. It'll take you about ... minutes. No problem.
